Parent/Teacher interviews were held in week eight this term and was well attended. I would like to thank all who attended. These occasions are a great opportunity for parents and caregivers to meet with teachers and discuss individual needs of students. I would like to thank the staff who gave up their time and attended interviews. Staff were able to report to parents that students have adapted well to the school's differentiated, pathway driven approach to curriculum delivery where students have better access to the curriculum through a more individualised approach



to learning and teaching at the school. The learning environment at ESHS focuses on ensuring that all students are engaged and experience success in their learning endeavours and are evolving as a community of learners. Staff at the school are working hard to ensure that the learning environment at Esperance SHS includes:

- Groupings which are fluid and flexible and approximate real-life situations;
- · Access to appropriate materials and resources;
- An atmosphere which encourages expression of new ideas, acceptance of diversity, and exploration;
- · Experiences reflecting learner interests and ideas;
- · Honouring the dignity of all learners.

Teachers are finding ways to reach out to individual learners at their varied points of readiness, interest, and preferred approaches to learning. It is exciting to see teachers embracing a differentiated learning environment and developing a clear and solid sense of what constitutes powerful curriculum and engaging instruction. I am looking forward to analyzing the data at the end of this semester to determine the academic improvement which will be inevitable when students are engaged and on task in the classroom. In the meantime we have teachers with high expectations teaching and students learning in a supported and more individualized manner.

It has been pleasing for me to see this term a large proportion of ESHS students in a variety of settings. I continue to be impressed with the respectful nature the vast majority of students demonstrate on a daily basis. As Principal of ESHS I am always impressed with the professionalism of our staff, who do such a great job in educating our students. This term has been especially busy and everyone has earned a well-deserved break.

I would like to wish all students and their families a happy and safe break and look forward to seeing everyone in the new term.

ENGLISH

This time last year I wrote about the importance of writing to help students understand what they know. In that article, I wrote that 'at its best, writing is learning'. As educators, we recognize that writing is more than a mere exercise in penmanship. It transcends the act of putting words on paper; it is a gateway to comprehension, reflection, and growth. But let us not forget its silent companion—the art of **reading**.

Reading is not merely decoding symbols or skimming through lines. It is a voyage—an exploration of ideas, emotions, and worlds beyond our own. When we read, we embark on a quest to understand, to question, and to connect. It is through reading that our minds stretch, our imaginations flourish, and our perspectives widen.

At the start of this year, the English Department made a solemn pledge: to nurture not only writers but also avid readers. We recognized that reading fuels writing, and vice versa. Our commitment? To infuse more **reading opportunities** into our programmes.

Next term most years will embark on their longer form novel/text study. In preparation for this, I ask you, the parents, to support us. When parents actively support reading at home, it creates a ripple effect. Children develop stronger vocabularies, critical thinking skills, and a lifelong love for learning. So, let's turn the pages together, one story at a time. Here are a few suggestions to support reading engagement on the home front:

- 1. **Book Nooks:** Designate a cosy corner in your home as a "book nook." Fill it with age-appropriate books, cushions, and soft lighting. Encourage your child to retreat there for quiet reading time.
- 2. **Model Reading:** Children learn by example. Let them see you immersed in a book. Discuss what you're reading, share interesting facts, and make reading a family affair.
- **3. Library Adventures:** Visit the town library regularly. Let your child explore shelves, pick their own books, and discover new genres. Libraries are treasure troves waiting to be explored.
- **4. Reading Challenges:** Set achievable reading goals. Maybe it's a certain number of pages per day or finishing a book by the end of the week. The <u>MSReadathon</u> will be open for registrations very soon. This is always a great way to encourage student participation.

SCIENCE

Year 7 Gummy Bear Investigation

Year 7 Students conducting and collecting results for the Gummy Bear Investigation - Will a Gummy Bear lose or gain water in each of the following solutions: salt water; sugar water; and tap water?

Students have been learning and developing a repertoire of science investigation skills. Initially students planned the experiment by stating the variables and hypothesis for the investigation. Each lab group conducted the experiment using the modelled set-up displayed on the whiteboard.

'Bears' were left for two days in each type of water; students recorded the new mass of each Gummy Bear. The class concluded that the bears gained mass, with the Gummy Bear placed in saltwater increasing in mass the most. The water moved into the bear, resulting in one very ballooned bear.

Did you know?

Along with our traditional offerings of ATAR and General subjects for Upper School, the HASS department also facilitates the Curtin University UniReady in Schools program.

This unique program can provide an alternative entry pathway to university. Students complete 4 university units of work throughout Year 12 that, on successful completion, gives the students an equivalent ATAR of 70. Not only do students learn university content, but they develop essential skills that will help them transition into further study after school. As an endorsed unit with the School Curriculum and Standards Authority, students are also able to count the units towards their WACE once they have successfully completed the course.

This year students are studying:

- · Introduction to Academic Writing;
- Foundations of Communications;
- Introduction to Humanities:
- · Introduction to Commerce.
